

## 1. CALL TO ORDER.

Mayor Samples called the meeting to order at 6:30 p.m. Mayor Samples, Mayor Pro Tempore Mabry, and Councilmembers Dodge, Kohlmann, Smith, and Stevens were in attendance. Mr. Johnson was out of town on business. A quorum was present. Staff present: Town Administrator Fellner; Treasurer Hursey; Planning Director Morris; Interim Police Chief Keziah, and Public Works Director Adair. Also present: Mr. Bob Harper, Harper, Poston & Moree; Town Attorney Moss, and Town Clerk Herrmann.

Mayor Samples: "(\*\*) Can you hear me? Very good. Welcome to the regular, irregular Surfside Beach Town Council meeting (\*\*) I want to say council thanks The Grand Theatre folks for allowing us to (\*\*) while council chambers are getting repaired, so we greatly appreciate it. We had a great day Saturday. It was probably one of the nicest weather days, and I think we had a very nice parade. We'll close some of those gaps up next year, but it was still fantastic, and I hope everybody had the opportunity to enjoy it. With that, Carmen Carella will lead us in prayer tonight, and Carmen, you're more than welcome to use the microphone."

Clerk's note: This meeting was held at The Grand Theatre, 301 South Kings Highway, Surfside Beach. The Grand Theatre prepared a digital recording which is on file in the clerk's office.

# B. FY Ended June 30, 2012 Comprehensive Annual Finance Report Executive Summary, Harper Poston & Moree, Mr. Bob Harper.

Mayor Samples: "And now, to something more sublime. We're gonna have the a fiscal year ended June 30<sup>th</sup>, 2012 Comprehensive Annual Financial Report and Executive Summary by Bob Harper and Stacy Moree."

Mr. Harper: "Is it on?"

Unknown Speaker: "Yeah."

Mr. Harper: "We prepared the annual audit for y'all and the audit is a long document that I think you've already been provided. Along with that audit, we did an executive summary. That summary will highlight some of your financial information. Tonight I will briefly go through that information with you, which is the smaller document. The first page of the document references that we did, in fact, did your audit, and you do, in fact, have a clean audit opinion, which is a good audit opinion. There were no exceptions to the audit (\*\*.) On page 2 there's a statement of net assets. It basically summarizes on a true accrual basis of accounting total assets for the town. Those total assets show that there are \$21,924,000 worth of assets in the town, consisting of cash, receivables, capital assets, inventory items and other assets. The town has liabilities of \$1,993,000, primarily of account payables, as well as bond and capital leases, and compensated absences. So, the town has net assets of \$19,930,000, so net assets are comprised of investment in capital assets, which are things like your buildings, your equipment, (\*\*.) There are \$1,211,000 in restricted assets for things like tourism, public safety and street improvements. Those are primary assets that are designate for specific purposes; things like accommodations tax usage, (\*\*.) The town has unrestricted assets of \$2,976,000 so that your total assets of \$19,930,000. On page 3, page 3 is again a accrual accounting according to GASB34, which takes into account everything that the town does. Here you'll see that we had general revenues of \$5,940,000 that is your property taxes, local accommodations taxes, business licenses, franchise taxes, hospitality taxes, unrestricted grants and contributions, and a little bit of gains on capital improvements and other miscellaneous income items. You have program revenues, charges for services of \$1,921,000, you have operating grants and contributions of \$601,000, capital grants you received \$518,000 for a total program revenues of \$3,041,000. Related expenses for those items are governmental activities, running the town, \$6,905,000, and business activities, your primary business are your sanitation department as well as your pier. There you have \$1,158,000 in expenditures. The town did, in fact, have a total expenditures of \$8,064,000. So you had a positive net change in assets of \$917,000. The next page, page 4, page 4 gives you an idea of your governmental funds, and the governmental funds again are primary operating the town, not the enterprise type of funds. The revenue sources there total of \$7,380,000. Taxes and fees were part of it. Licenses and permits; fines and forfeitures; intergovernmental; other revenues, and you can see the pie graph down there that the taxes and fees represent 51-percent; licenses and permits 20-percent; fines 2.9-percent; intergovernmental 21.18percent; and other sources of revenue three. Governmental funding type expenditures, I'm on page 5, you can see here that we have a total of \$7,494,000 worth of expenditures. This breaks down the places that you spend your money. The pie chart at the bottom shows that 33-percent goes to public safety. general governmental 14-percent; debt service 6.9-percent; capital outlay 11-percent; non-departmental 3.79; cultural and recreation 4.62; maintenance 1.54; street 17-percent; grounds 3.51-percent; building and zoning 3.3-percent. So that shows you what you do with your money after you receive it. The following page, page 6, is your enterprise fund. Again, that's your sanitation and your pier fund. You see that you did take in \$1,536,000. The related expenditures with that are \$1,154,000, so you had net income for those activities of \$383,000. That's a quick overview of the finances of the town. In the course of doing your audit, we did not run across any situation that we had to bring before the administration or council, irregularities or anything of that nature. The audit report itself is very detailed and comprehensive. In the course of your review, if you have any questions and would like to follow back up with us, we'd be more than glad to respond to you directly, and if you have any questions now, we'd be glad to answer those questions."

Mayor Samples: "Any questions? No questions?"

Ms. Dodge: "Mr. Mayor."

Mayor Samples: "Ms. Dodge."

Ms. Dodge: "I do have one. Finance is not my forte. Under government funds revenues a, we have \$7,380,140 and we spent \$7,494,371, which meant we spent more than we took in. How do we, how do we compensate for that? Is that a question I would ask you, Mr. Harper?"

\$7 million, we have a shortage of \$100 thousand. That's a, that's a relatively small percentage, but where that money is really made up is in your sanitation department. You had a positive cash flow in that sanitation department, so that's the primary source for where those funds were made up. Any other questions?"

Mr. Harper: "That is, that is a question, that's a good question. Basically, when we talked about

Mayor Samples: "...a the smallest area that in the past year that we, the town spent money on is a 1.54-percent for maintenance, and I don't know if you can answer the question, but that just seems like a real small amount of money given that the town's assets, which you covered earlier, I think were up to about \$19 million, \$20 million in assets, which a lot of those assets, of course, were fixed assets that just seems to me would require some degree of maintenance and, and so, what do you think about 1.4percent. Is that something that we want to do a..."

Mr. Harper: "That clearly is a very small percentage, so that would be something that you could project going forward (\*\*) where you may invest more money in the improvements of those types of capital assets that you have. There's no question about that. There would be some normal type of maintenance that actually is absorbed in those funds, but the specific answer is that is a total ratio and that would be something that you might want to really consider going forward (\*\*) maintenance and basic improvements of your capital assets and that is something that would prolong its life and is a good management responsibility (\*\*)."

Mayor Samples: "Thank you. Thank you. Any other questions or comments for Mr. Poston? [sic] Thank you, sir. I appreciate it. I'm sure if, if members of, I would encourage members to take a look at the detailed document. There's a lot more information in there, and I'm certain that if you do, that that will raise other questions and I know that they would be happy to provide additional information for clarification purposes."

Mr. Harper: "Our information to get in touch with us in on these letter heads so you can get in touch us. We will be more than glad to respond to any questions specifically you might have, and we thank y'all very much."

C. Keep Surfside Beach Beautiful Committee Recommendation - Adopt-a-Beach Program, Mr. Ralph Magliette.

Mayor Samples: "The next item on the agenda is a recommendation from the Keep Surfside Beach Beautiful Committee. It is the Adopt-a-Beach program, and Mr. Ralph Magliette is gonna make a short presentation, and we welcome, we welcome you here, Ralph."

280 Mr. Magliette: "Very briefly, we are seeking to do a partnership with the South Carolina 281 Department of Housing and Environmental Controls Office of Ocean and Coastal Resource Management 282 who has recognized the need and desirability of litter free beaches. So what we're asking the council for 283 is approval for the Keep Surfside Beach Beautification Committee to enter into a partnership agreement 284 with them, and the requirement is a, from the State is that the beach area that is adopted be cleaned 285 twice a year. However, given the beauty of our beach and that we're a tourist location, we get a lot of 286 rate-ables [sic] from that the decision was made in talking with people and getting some initial 287 agreements from volunteers that we really could do that on a monthly basis, so the goal of this a, a 288 volunteers for the Adopt-a-Beach would be to on a monthly basis do a beach cleanup. I brought forward 289 about a month ago the actual forms, there's an actual Adopt-a-Beach Cleanup form, which gives different 290 types of wastes that are, that can be put into different specific categories and then there's a South 291 Carolina website where the data is a basically sent to and the way we have envisioned it with volunteers 292 is we have it broken up into basically specific bits going from 16th Avenue North down to 16th Avenue 293 South which people can, volunteers can take one, two, three sections, and currently we have about 40-294 percent of these (\*\*) locations adopted. The critical part of the Adopt-a-Beach program and probably the 295 most difficult part to do will be the beach accesses, because that seems to have the most amount of litter, 296 and that would mean you have a parking, walking into the parking area, up the stairs, and over the dune. 297 if it's a small area, again, you have the same problem going up over the stairway and then along the sand 298 to the beach. That seems to be the area where you'll find the most amount of, of a litter, cigarette butts, 299 those types of things, and that's also the most difficult type of little to pick up, because really you have to 300 basically bend, bend over and pick it up with your hand. You can't use the a, the sand machinery that's 301 used for the large areas on those small areas. It's basically something that has to be done manually, so 302 the hope is that council will see fit to approve this program, and a give our chairman, Jim Toney, approval 303 to enter into an agreement with the state to do this and to allow us to a post for volunteers to complete the 304 sections we don't have any volunteers currently. The good thing about this program is that there's no 305 requirement of town funds. There's no town labor required. There's no staff required. This is gonna be a 306 hundred percent volunteer effort in conjunction with the Surfside Beach beautification committee, and the 307 hope is that through the business committee and the beautification business subcommittee that we will 308 have buy-ins for local businesses to hopefully adopt 1st Avenue North, Surfside Pier, and 1st Avenue 309 South have adopted by local businesses as that seems to be the highest concentration of litter during the 310 summer areas. So, hopefully, we will be able to get most of the area adopted, and then once that's done, 311 we will present the complete application to the state and once we get approval we'll start our monthly 312 cleanup efforts and hopefully, in six months and one year we'll be able to see a trend line to see what 313 kind of garbage we pick up and what the duration of it is. You know, what areas are hot spots. What 314 areas are relatively clean, and what kind of spike we, versus the tourists versus non-tourists areas. 315 There's a lot of good data to be gleaned over time, and hopefully, that information will help us with any 316 anti-litter campaign. Thank you." 317 318

Ms. Mabry: "I just want thank you (\*\*.) Thank you so much for bringing this to council. It's a, to me, it's a great idea. It really shows that you're going a long way with the committee and thank you so much for the presentation."

## i. #12-77 Arbor Day, Public Works Director Adair.

Ms. Herrmann: "Don't worry, I'll get you. Arbor Day Proclamation this is Proclamation 12-77."

Whereas, in 1872 J. Sterling Morton proposed to the Nebraska Board of Agriculture that a special day be set aside for the planting of trees; and the holiday called Arbor Day was first observed with the planting of more than a million trees in Nebraska; Arbor Day is now observed throughout the national and the world; and trees can reduce the erosion of our precious topsoils by wind and water, lower our heating and cooling costs, moderate the temperature, clean the air, produce oxygen and provide habitat for wildlife; trees are a renewable resource giving us paper, wood for our homes, fuel for our fires and countless other wood products; trees in our town increase property values, enhance the economic vitality of business areas, and beautify our community; trees, wherever they are planted, are a source of joy and spiritual renewal. Now, therefore, I, Douglas F. Samples, mayor of the Town of Surfside Beach, do hereby proclaim December 7<sup>th</sup>, 2012 as Arbor Day in the Town of Surfside Beach, and I urge all citizens to celebrate Arbor Day and to support efforts to protect our trees and woodlands, and I further urge all citizens to plant and care for trees to gladden the heart and promote the well-being of this and future generations. It's dated this 28<sup>th</sup> day of November, 2012.

## ii. #12-78 Congratulations Walter Spall, Retirement from US Coast Guard Auxiliary.

Ms. Morris: "Good evening, Mayor and Council. Staff issued a total of 98 permits in the month of November. We performed 108 inspections, and nine sets of plans were reviewed. We had two new residential permits issued; one on South Beach Drive and the other on South Palmetto Way. Two plans reviews for commercial, for commercial projects were submitted. One was the Waffle House that will be located on 17 North beside Dagwood's and DeFalco's added an addition to the rear of its existing garage. (\*\*) We received a total of 38 complaints in November from building without permits, nuisances, structures, structures in need of repair, and general property maintenance issues. We have notified the property owners of the violations, and will conduct follow-up inspections to ensure the violations are resolved. Chief Keziah: "Good evening citizens, Mayor and Council. This month was a very good month for us. Our calls for service were actually down for the first month in a while. We went down 11-percent. It gave us a little bit of time to, to actually do some building renovations in our building; to paint the department. We put some sweat equity, which I found out that I'm not a painter by trade. I think I put one gallon on the wall, and my wife says I put one gallon on my pants, so, but we have been busy getting those renovations done. Our arrests for this month were up 20-percent from last month, a correction, from last year, this month last year. It was up 20-percent. On our personnel actions, Matt Harper, who is the police officer that we hired that I told you about last month, he's completed his full field training program and he's released to full duty now, so we've got an extra police officer on the streets. Also, Nicole Solorzano, who was one of our dispatchers has recently been transferred to a police officer slot, and I'm taking her to the academy in Columbia tomorrow for her registration, so she'll go to the academy. hopefully, January, it might be February before the slot is available there. But we're pushing for January to get her out before Bike Week hits. So, it's exciting; we're excited for her. The, a, interviews for the open police officer slots and the communications officer slot are being held Thursday and Friday of this week. We've got interviews planned most of both days for those positions. We did do a corporal process and at the end of the process promoted patrolman Brian Clark to the rank of corporal. His first day as a supervisor was today, so I think his sleeves are a little bit longer with the, with the stripes on them now. He's gonna do a great job. I think most of you know Brian from the beach. He's been the beach patrol for the last couple of years in the truck. During November we did three community outreach events. We also conducted the 5 and 10K Turkey Trots when 13 officers came in on Thanksgiving morning, direct traffic and worked the event. It actually was lovely weather and I think it went real well. We also had two officers that participated in the public service commercial shoot that targets under aged drinking. You'll probably see the commercial running over the holiday season on some local TV stations, and the last thing I want to bring to your attention is the a trespassing program that we actually came up with draft proposal that will be delivered to the administrator for a legal review. This is the same type program that Myrtle Beach uses where the police can assist property owners who are not in town or are not on the

Mayor Samples: "Moving right along, we have a fire report."

Ms. Fellner: "Thank you, and I guess something came up and he was not able to make it over here."

Mayor Samples: "Well, we have a, we, we have the written report. Is there..."

Ms. Fellner: "Right, and a, for the public's, I'll just say that there were 47 incidents, 35 of which were medical emergencies, and there were 16 fire inspections completed, public education events there were three, and six preplans were done. During the month of November all members attended three Monday night drills, live burns at the Murrells Inlet fire department training grounds, and also participated in a company drill on Saturday, November 10<sup>th</sup>. All of the required ISO drills were conducted to the requirements as set forth by the Insurance Service Organization, and Monday, November 19th all members of the department underwent their physicals that are administered once a year, and a, they all passed with the exception of one firefighter who had to go, who had to return to the doctor in the following week, and did so, and has been given a clean bill of health, and the last thing I wanted to mention is Chief Packard may be able to return to light duty on February 20th. That is the latest word we have on his surgery."

### F. Administrator's Report – Update on Current Events.

Mayor Samples: "Moving right along; the administrator's report."

Ms. Fellner: "Very short tonight. There's just two items. The coyotes; our contract with Alpha Predator Removal service is expired without any successful captures. After investigating the area, they believe the coyotes have moved. They say that the cubs probably got big enough and there was so much human activity within the area that they decided to leave. A dollar figure for our expenditures to date is \$3,589, and we have not received any notification from the public recently regarding sightings of the creatures. So, at this point and since there's, since covotes generally are seen mostly in the summer when they have pups, they're much more active, and prone to interface with the public at that time, a, we may not want to proceed at this time. If council does wish me to proceed in the hiring of a contractor, I would need my authorization limit increased, because my limit is \$5,000, and most of the other contractors to even start are \$2,000. So that's where we are with the coyotes."

Mayor Samples: "What are the druthers of council? Any comment? Councilman Smith."

Mr. Smith: "Mr. Mayor, I think we've done enough and that since the public has not said anything about additional coyotes, I think we should terminate it at this point."

Mayor Samples: "Ms. Dodge."

Ms. Dodge: "I, I would also say that we should terminate it at this point. I think they've gone elsewhere. I do see (\*\*) out on the highway, but (\*\*) I think they're gone too. Thanks."

Mayor Samples: "Ms. Kohlmann."

Ms. Kohlmann: "I agree we should terminate it, especially there's no community here to say whether it worked or not or if they see them or not actually."

Mayor Samples: "Well, I agree with that, but I would like to have a fallback position in the event this returns to us...:

Ms. Fellner: "Absolutely."

Mayor Samples: "..., and by that I mean there's gotta be some, some more drastic action that is allowable. I don't know what DHEC [sic] says, a, a, DNR, Department of National, Natural Resources. Let's find out. Okay. The methods that we used were clearly, didn't arrive at the outcome that, that I think we were striving for, and I'm glad they're gone, but I got a feeling they'll be back."

Ms. Dodge: "Mr. Mayor."

Mayor Samples: "Ms. Dodge."

Ms. Dodge: "I have a friend who's an outdoorsman who recommended a group of people, we were mentioned, but it could be citizens or whoever, walk through the area where they're usually seen and as a group (\*\*) that will drive them out, and usually they (\*\*) so that might be a cost free way of doing something before we get into doing anymore."

Mayor Samples: "Well, I'm gonna, I'm gonna remind you of that when the people come back and, and a, when they come back about the coyotes, okay. It's a good idea."

Mr. Stevens: "Mr. Mayor."

Mayor Samples: "Mr. Stevens."

Mr. Stevens: "I have some friends with, with Winyah Bay Archery Club out of Georgetown, and a, I know that sometimes you have to take drastic measures, but these are experienced hunters, bow hunters, no guns, and if they do show up, that may be your best bet to get rid of them once and for all."

Mayor Samples: "Thank you. Alright, anything else for the administrator, or ...."

Ms. Fellner: "Yes, just one last thing. The pier enhancement bid, last Thursday I sent council a copy of the proposed bid packet for the pier enhancements, and if there are no changes, staff would like to proceed with posting the bid."

Mayor Samples: "I, I don't know if everybody's had a chance to review it. I know I have. I, I reviewed it and I certainly think we do need to proceed. Are there any objections to proceeding with the request for proposals? Thanks, so you have approval."

### 7. BUSINESS.

Mayor Samples: "Moving right along, we are now entering the business section, and I believe that a Mr. Stevens you, you have something that you wanted to say."

Mr. Stevens: "Mr. Mayor, the business committee met on Thursday, December 6<sup>th</sup>, and they overwhelmingly supported and passed and approved Ordinance 12-0729 Overlay, so at this, with the a full support of the business committee at this time I would like to make a motion to reconsider the motion to defer Ordinance 12-0729 and move it to January, the second [sic] meeting in January."

Mayor Samples: "There is a motion to reconsider the motion which was adopted which was to defer that ordinance until the second meeting of January, and so if I understand your motion to reconsider, it is to do it earlier? To bring it back sooner?"

Mr. Stevens: "Yes, that's correct."

Mayor Samples: "There's a motion on the floor."

Ms. Dodge: "Mr. Mayor."

Mayor Samples: "Ms. Dodge.

Ms. Dodge: "I would second that motion. That sounds like a, a good move."

Mayor Samples: "There's a motion; there's a second. Any discussion? Just for clarification purposes, then a does that mean that this will be on the next regular meeting's agenda?"

Mr. Stevens: "Mr. Vote, Mr. Mayor, point of a, order. We have to a vote on the motion to reconsider first, and then we'll go to a second motion."

Mayor Samples: "I, I stand corrected. Any other discussion? All in favor say aye."

All Members: "Aye."

Mayor Samples: "Hearing none, the motion to reconsider is approved."

Mr. Stevens: "Mr. Mayor."

Mayor Samples: "Mr. Stevens"

Mr. Stevens: "If I may, I would like to make a motion to place Ordinance 12-0729 the town overlay on the first meeting January 8<sup>th</sup> council meeting as the first item in the business for consideration for second reading."

Mayor Samples: "Just for clarification purposes, there is a motion, but before we proceed to a second, is that the proper way to handle a motion to reconsider? So you can substitute a motion after the motion, after the motion, after the motion to reconsider is approved."

Ms. Herrmann: "The council, excuse me, Mr. Mayor, you want me to continue?"

Mayor Samples: "I do."

Ms. Herrmann: "The council has to agree to reconsider the question. Now that council has agreed to reconsider the question, a new motion to offered determining the course of action for the business item."

Mayor Samples: "Very good. Want to state, restate the motion or you want to read the motion?"

Mr. Stevens: "The motion is to bring Ordinance 12-0729 to the next council meeting on January 8<sup>th</sup> and put it on in the business section for A and for second reading."

Mayor Samples: "Thank you. There is a motion."

Mr. Smith: "Second."

Mayor Samples: "Any discussion. All in favor say aye."

All Members: "Aye."

Mayor Samples: "Opposed? Hearing none the motion is adopted."

# A. Second Reading Ordinance #12-0727 to amend §9-16 Decals and Exemptions for Parking Decals, Councilmember Kohlmann.

Mayor Samples: "Alright, the first regular business item would be the second reading of Ordinance 12-0727 to amend Section 9-16, decals and exemptions for parking decals. This is second reading. Can I get a motion?"

Mr. Stevens: "Mr. Mayor, I'd like to make a motion that we adopt second reading of Ordinance 12-0727."

Mayor Samples: "There is a motion."

Mr. Smith: "Second."

Mayor Samples: "Any discussion? Clarification, in the ordinance itself it talks about nonresident, section a, we require proof it says verification of proof of residential property ownership. Do we require the same proof with respect to the golf carts, the vehicles? That's a question."

Ms. Kohlmann: "Ask that again."

Mayor Samples: "Well, the change to the ordinance, which is in green, it says decals issued for full time residents and non-resident residential property owner vehicles, including golf carts. All persons residing or owning residential property within the corporate limits of the town shall be entitled to one free decal per vehicle to be issued by the town upon verification of current vehicle registration or verification of proof of residential property ownership, and I guess what I want to say is that I presume that that means when we verify their vehicle registration, that in fact that vehicle is registered in the town, but we don't say that."

Ms. Kohlmann: "Mr. Mayor."

Mayor Samples: "Ms. Kohlmann,"

Ms. Kohlmann: "It would be done the same way it's done currently. We give out stickers to, they pay currently for parking stickers, so it would be the same format that's already in place. It's already being done."

Mayor Samples: "What verification of proof of residential property ownership are you expecting to see?"

Ms. Kohlmann: "The same one that we are currently using, which that would be up to staff does that I don't know exactly what they do like when you go up to get your anything through the town, you have to present what it is they're asking you for then."

667 Mayor Samples: "Right now they don't require proof or verification of property ownership."

669 Ms. Kohlmann: "For the parking sticker."

Mayor Samples: "No."

Ms. Kohlmann: "For the parking sticker...."

(Two speaking at once.)

Mayor Samples: "What, what they require, what they require now is, is they require a vehicle registration that shows that the vehicle is registered in the Town of Surfside Beach, which is separate than and different from and distinct from property ownership. I don't have a problem adopting it. I just want when, when staff goes to implement it, I guess they'll know what we mean."

Mr. Smith: "Mr. Mayor, I'd like to offer a suggestion, then. The verification of proof of residential property ownership would be their tax notice with their names on it, and that should correspond to their vehicle registration, have the same names."

Mayor Samples: "So, you're adding that to the ordinance, or just..."

Mr. Smith: "No, sir. That's just a clarification."

Mayor Samples: "For the record, and we are taking verbatim? We'll decide that later then, okay. For the record, I would like Mr. Smith's comments recorded verbatim. Okay, thank you. All in favor, say aye."

All Members: "Aye."

Mayor Samples: "Opposed?"

## B. Second Reading Ordinance #12-0732 to amend §9-7 No Parking Places, Councilmember Kohlmann.

Mayor Samples: "Moving right along, this also second reading to amend no parking, this is section, let me get it right, this is Ordinance 12-0732 to amend Section 9-7 no parking spaces. If I could, I would like, would you like to make a motion to suspend the rules so we can have some discussion?"

Ms. Mabry: "I move we suspend the rules."

Mayor Samples: "There is a motion."

Mr. Smith: "Second."

Mayor Samples: "There is a second. All in, Mr. Smith, all in favor say aye."

All Members: "Aye."

Mayor Samples: "Opposed? Will you defer to me? This, this ordinance is also up for second reading, and I'm not certain if, if it's been well thought out. This ordinance, a, is not clear to me what the intent is. The intent is to eliminate parking on Ocean Boulevard. It does that. It eliminates parking on Ocean Boulevard for all practical purposes. The part that bothers me in, in the way the ordinance is written, well, many things bother me in the way it's written. But, it doesn't say R-3. It doesn't say Ocean Boulevard. It doesn't say C-3. So, it's applicable throughout the town. Now, just for the record, and I don't think Ms. Dodge will mind me clarifying, there were comments made at the last meeting and the record will show that it was stated that South Carolina law prohibits parking 10-feet within a driveway.

Well, that just isn't so. South Carolina law does not do that. The reason that I bring it up, because if you live in R-1, or you live in R-2, or you live in R-3, wherever you live, you're parked in a right-of-way in front of your own house or a friend of your is, and they're within 10-feet of your driveway, technically, this ordinance passes, it's illegal. Now, we're either gonna enforce the laws as written or we better start writing them as we intend them. That's a technical part. The fact of the matter is this is bad for business in the Town of Surfside Beach. Like it or not, we're a beach town. We're not a gated community. People have been parking on Ocean Boulevard forever, and this is a backdoor attempt... 10 feet of driveways, 10-feet or 5-feet of rights-of-way, 10-feet, 10-feet of rights-of-way... I'm sorry, of driveways, beach accesses, which it was determined we have 32 of. I would ask a simple question, how, does anybody know how many parking spaces this is gonna eliminate on Ocean Boulevard?"

Ms. Kohlmann: "Mr. Mayor."

Mayor Samples: "Ms. Kohlmann."

Ms. Kohlmann: "I do believe an extensive report was given by the parking committee. It was very extensive with a whole listing of the 89 spaces that they could free up for additional parking on Ocean Boulevard. In addition to that..."

Mayor Samples: "(\*\*) ... are you answering the question? There're 89."

(Two speaking at once.)

Ms. Kohlmann: "(\*\*)... exactly how many spots. There's not really technically legal spots as it is now, because there's no parking signs at every single beach walk, and people park there. So there are, it says no parking right on every single beach access."

Mayor Samples: "It says no parking at the beach access, and I believe that means in front of the beach access." There is no 10-feet requirement at this point in time."

Ms. Kohlmann: "Okay, then it's within 20-feet of a crosswalk by state law. So, every beach access technically, I mean if you're looking at, I'm, just let me finish, Mr. Mayor, if you're looking at state law, which I believe you're all gonna go there shortly, technically 20-feet from every crosswalk, and if you're telling them to, to apply the rules the way the rules should be, then you're losing even more because 20-feet from each crosswalk. I'm looking at 10-feet."

Mayor Samples: "But, we're talking about 30-feet from the intersection, and in fact, the way the, in fact the way that the public works department has drawn the yellow line, because of line of sight issues, I get it. I get that, okay. I get that from a safety standpoint. What I don't get, speaking plainly, are these other additional eliminated parking. I just don't get it."

Ms. Kohlmann: "May I offer a solution, Mr. Mayor?"

Mayor Samples: "Yes."

Ms. Kohlmann: "Okay (\*\*)"

Mayor Samples: "Was that something submitted to the council or is that...?"

Ms. Kohlmann: "No, it's just pictures that I took..."

Mayor Samples: "Is that something new tonight?"

Ms. Kohlmann: "I just did it in the last hour before the meeting. Just pictures for reference just so you can see what I'm trying to explain. I just want to explain myself. If you don't want to accept, fine."

Mayor Samples: "I want to see them. I'd like to see them in time to consider them. (\*\*) second

(Two speaking at once.)

Ms. Kohlmann: "(\*\*) Well, this has been going on forever and ever, and I think that we've all decided compromise is really important in town, and just because there's an issue that nobody can seem to come up with anything doesn't mean that we don't address it, even if it's just a little tiny thing, and if it doesn't work, we go back and we don't do it or we change it again. But, just saying we have a problem and then not doing anything about it over and over each time new people come up here, I don't, I don't think it's really helping, but what this is, is there are locations and I would like, actually like the council to consider a consensus to have staff go along maybe with John Adair or whoever to look at these locations. Now these locations here are all locations along Ocean Boulevard and I. I found 52 parking spaces, and there's no parking signs there, but when I asked who put those no parking signs up, and well logically (\*\*), nobody seems to know. There were put up there by prior administration, even three years ago in the minutes you said you didn't know who put them up there. They were there and you don't know who put them there..."

Mayor Samples: "That's right. I still don't."

Ms. Kohlmann: "...Okay ... "

Mayor Samples: "I still don't know who authorized them."

Ms. Kohlmann: "And if you look there's even one that stands out a lot between 8<sup>th</sup> and 9<sup>th</sup> Avenue South right on Ocean Boulevard. It's the safest place on Ocean Boulevard for our beach goers to park. There's at least seven spots there, and there's no parking signs there, and on the west side of Ocean Boulevard it's safe and I think that when you're looking at the 10-feet from driveways, this isn't about eliminating parking because Ocean Boulevard has plenty of parking on both sides, even when you incorporate this, and Ocean Boulevard has never been to the point that there's not a spot to be had on Ocean Boulevard from beach goers except during 4<sup>th</sup> of July. So you're not really telling people they can't park there. It's a safety issue."

Mayor Samples: "How many parking spaces will remain on Ocean Boulevard if this ordinance is adopted as is? Do you know?"

Ms. Kohlmann: "Well, if you re [sic,] if you would have staff review these 52 spots that are now taking with no parking signs that were just put up there by somebody and arbitrarily posted, then I don't think we're having a problem. We're giving you more than we're taking away. I don't know the exact number of the beach access, because I don't believe that it is anything, because it's already 20-feet from a crosswalk. I don't think we're taking anything away from the beach accesses."

Mayor Samples: "Any other comments?"

Ms. Mabry: "Alright, I'm not gonna get emotional, because it's just about the facts. State law states you cannot park within 30-feet of a signal light, stop sign, flashing beacon, or (\*\*) the roadway. It does not say within 30-feet of all intersections, and we're gonna have to be very careful about implementing laws that are only good for the Town of Surfside Beach. Nobody else in South Carolina has these rules. How are they possibly gonna know, and how is the police department gonna enforce this when we are making up laws that don't even apply to South Carolina? I think that could be ambiguous at best. Then on number 4 it says in front of a driveway. Well, this is what the law says. You cannot park in front of a driveway or near enough to hinder the driveway use by others. It has no other meaning. That's state law. So, if you and I decide that that's what we know, that's what we've been taught, and I did talk to Columbia, they told me where to get this in writing. How are we gonna enforce it if it's, in fact, 10-feet from the driveway? Who's gonna know? Nobody, and then we have on number 5, who determines property owner? It says that any private property without consent of owner. That is, and I think the intent

was a good intent the way I read it, so that if you push people off of the Ocean Boulevard you don't want them parking into the residential area. However, how are our policemen possibly gonna know who's a property owner, who's a renter, who's a visitor, who came into town? My brothers come here from Virginia, Florida, and North Carolina. I park in their yard. I have permission. If you rent, you have implied permission from the owner, so it is impossible to enforce the biggest part of this ordinance. If you want to remove parking from Ocean Boulevard, the best thing to simply say is we want to remove it. It's gonna be plain and simple. It's gonna be easily enforced. We just put up the right signage. I'm not for it. I probably would never vote for it, because of our parking situation, although I do love the idea in my heart. I just don't know that it's a practical idea. We have to go by, we cannot just arbitrarily come up here and make laws that are not enforceable, and this goes throughout the entire town. It does not address Ocean Boulevard separately. It is through the entire town, and there you're gonna spot, well, really didn't mean it for R-1, but I kind a mean it for R-3, but we're not gonna enforce it there. When you make an ordinance, you better be ready to enforce that whole ordinance to the full extent of the law. I think it needs to go back. I think the intent needs to come back to council exactly what you mean to do. Do it openly, do it honestly, and let's just get it done, and I think as a, a, talk to the police department. Talk to the attorneys, and let's get it done the proper way."

Mayor Samples: "Mr. Smith."

Mr. Smith: "I think that this wording is okay the way it is. Item 1, 2, 3, 5, and 6 were in the ordinance. The change was made, this was the previous wording; any place where vehicles would block the use of a driveway or parking lot. These are the words that were added in place of that sentence: within 10-feet of a beach access, driveway, or entrance and exit to a parking lot. Now the reason we did that, at least we want to do that, is because that's the safety issue. When you're coming out of a beach access or a driveway and somebody is parked close to the driveway, the visibility is reduced. It's impossible to get it precise like some folks want it, but this is a good attempt. You know, a lot of people in town who would like no parking on Ocean Boulevard, but if we did that, those spaces mentioned by Councilman [sic] Kohlmann would not be available. So where there is availability, I think we should allow them to park on Ocean Boulevard, and where there is not availability, like within 10-feet of a driveway, we need to stop them, and as far all over town, I know next to my driveway. I wouldn't want somebody being within 10-feet of my driveway, if they're parked on the right-of-way, and so, I think it's, will be applied evenly by our police. I think that they are intelligent, and responsible. They do a good job of protecting our town, and I think that they'll have the where with all to enforce this ordinance properly. This is a good change to the ordinance. A lot of people have been working a long time, not just this council, but previous council's have been trying to do something. Fortunately now we have people that are interested in moving forward on this. We've got the parking committee that made the recommendation, and I think it's time to move forward."

Mayor Samples: "Thank you."

Ms. Dodge: "Mr. Mayor."

Mayor Samples: "Ms. Dodge."

Ms. Dodge: "First of all, I made the comment at a meeting that there was a state law which said there was, there was a prohibition of 10-feet from a driveway. I was mistaken. I told the mayor I was mistaken, but the 10-feet is a safety issue for somebody backing out of a driveway. You cannot see. Ocean Boulevard is an absolute mess. I was gonna say something really awful, cluster, but it's a mess. In the summertime and people are at risk, and if we pass this ordinance and it is applicable all over town, that's a good thing. We want people to come here to go to our parking lots. That's why we built them, and if we're going to skirt the issue, then we're going to continue to have empty parking lots except on the 4<sup>th</sup> of July, maybe, unless somebody can find somebody's yard to park in, but I think this is a good regulation. I think it's well written, and I certainly would be for it."

Mayor Samples: "I, I have one last comment, because it is a bad, in my judgment, and we'll just have to agree to disagree. I think it's inappropriate to apply this throughout the town. I don't think, I think

what we're doing is, a, we're using a hammer to solve a particular issue that a small group of people have. The fact of the matter is that for 12 weeks out of the year we want Ocean Boulevard full. It's what keeps your taxes low. It's what brings people to town. I. I see people shaking their head. They don't know the numbers. I asked the, the guestion I asked a little while ago, how many parking spaces will remain on Ocean Boulevard. No one knows the answer to that. No one wants to know the answer to that, because in fact it is a back door attempt to eliminate parking on Ocean Boulevard."

Ms. Mabry: "I just have one question, and if the interim chief can answer this, how can you ticket someone that does not have any knowledge of that law, and since it's not South Carolina law, how can we go up and ticket someone that has no idea that they're parking illegally, unless we're willing to put no parking signs every 10-feet of every single driveway. Now, if you're willing to do that, and I think that'd look a little bit worse than the cars do, but if you're willing to do that, fine, but nobody knows this law exists except the people in this room tonight, and we expect all of our visitors, and I know what's gonna happen, somebody's gonna stand right up at the podium and say, well I drove down Surfside Drive or I rode down Ocean Boulevard and there're cars parked everywhere, and they're not being ticketed, and they won't have a clue that they're even parking illegally, and I just want to know how we can burden our police department and ask them to do something that's really and truly a made-up law here tonight."

Ms. Kohlmann: "Mr. Mayor."

Mayor Samples: "Ms. Kohlmann."

Ms. Kohlmann: "Well, I had discussion with Chief Keziah, and a, I, first I'm offended that you think it's a back door deal. I don't think that's a fair thing to say, because a lot of work was done on this by other people and myself, so I take offense to that. But, we'll just move along, and it is done in many places, some places are 5-feet from driveways, some are 10, and some are 15 depending upon what state you look at or town, and (\*\*) the fact that you saying it would be a selected enforcement, well, Town of Surfside Beach already does selective enforcement. They do it with fireworks, they do it with smoking on the beach, they do with golf carts. This is falling right into the line of what Surfside Beach does, and it's not, it should not be looked at the way you're looking at it. It should be a tool. It's just simply another tool for the police officers, because there are people in this town that have a problem getting in and out of driveways, and they're, and it's, and it's a constant battle for some of them. I don't think that this is gonna be the police officers are gonna go out there and start ticketing everybody. They don't do that now with the regulations. We don't want to run tourists off. That's not what this is about. This is about an older person has a car parked there every single day, the same car, and all he can say is call the police and ask them to send the officer and just ask the people to move the car. If they don't move the car, then they have a tool now, the tool is they ticket it. I don't see anything wrong with this. I think people are reading way too much into it and it's safety more than it is anything else."

Ms. Dodge: "Mr. Mayor."

Mayor Samples: "Ms. Dodge."

Ms. Dodge: "I agree with Ms. Kohlmann, and I resent this being called a backdoor effort to do anything. I don't go in the backdoor. I go to the front door and I speak out, and that's what we are doing with this."

Mayor Samples: "Well, I appreciate the way you feel, and, and I understand you feeling that way. Rest assured, I really believe what I'm saying also, because the fact is, is that there's been talk about eliminating parking on Ocean Boulevard for a number of administrations. I, I know, I served. I was against it then. I'm against it now. I still believe this is a backdoor attempt to eliminate parking on Ocean Boulevard. But, we'll find out, folks, understand, we're gonna vote, understand. In the peak of the season, we will have the opportunity to review what it is we have done. Any other discussion?"

Mr. Stevens: "Mr. Mayor."

Mayor Samples: "Mr. Stevens."

Mr. Stevens: "I support this law. I think it's a good thing. I have been in the Myrtle Beach, and Myrtle Beach is basically eliminated parking on Ocean Boulevard from 27th Avenue or 29th Avenue South all the way up to about 29th Avenue North. So, they have done it. It didn't hurt their business. They still have plenty of people, plenty of tourists. I don't think it's gonna affect anybody. Riding back from church on Sunday, I did notice that there was a fire hydrant right next to a beach access. Rode down next to one of the other, our fellow councilmen asked me to look at the area down on 1st Avenue and 2nd Avenue at the fire hyd [sic,] hydrant right next to the beach access. I saw a lot of beach accesses within 5- to 6-feet of a driveway. So if you park there, you're gone [sic] block a driveway. I rode all the way down the boulevard to Melody Lane and I saw many places where cars just can't park, and if they're parking there. then they're also parking on the sidewalk as well. I would say also that I, I noticed that the fellows working and putting trees out, and they're blocking the part where parking would be. If we do something like put bushes and trees up and down the Ocean Boulevard that will, we don't have to put signs, and I was looking at the pictures here, and I've walked by, this picture right here, 1st Avenue North between Ocean and Dogwood at least two to three hundred times since I've been in, in town, and it says no parking between signs, and I also often wondered why, where these signs came from, but it says at any place where official signs prohibit parking, you can't park there. Got to do something about parking, and I think this is the right step in the right direction. Thank you."

Mayor Samples: "All in favor say aye."

Unknown Speakers: "Aye."

Mayor Samples: "Oh, I'm sorry, we have a motion, you're right. Good, good. There is a motion to come in under the rules?" (*Not audibly recorded*: Ms. Mabry indicated she moved to reconvene regular session. Mr. Smith seconded.) "There's a motion, there's a second. All in favor say aye."

## 8. DISCUSSION - Any matters of concern or information to be discussed by Town Council.

Mayor Samples: "Moving right along, we have a discussion, Section number 8, discussion, any items of interest to councilmembers. We'll begin with a, Ms. Fellner is gonna bring us up to speed on something that I know was sent to us in our email this morning, I believe. The agreement, bylaws review of the Surfside Beach Youth Sports Association."

## A. Agreement and Bylaws Review – Surfside Beach Youth Sports Association, Inc., Administrator Fellner.

Ms. Fellner, "Yes, Mr. Mayor. This morning I received from the attorney a set of the revised bylaws and (\*\*), a proposed contract, and the articles of incorporation, and the attorney has my comments regarding these documents, and the only item he did not alter that I noticed in the documents he sent back and we discussed that today. The only one that I requested that he alter was under dispute resolution via the circuit court, and I'll let him explain to the council why he did not, why he elected not to do that."

Mayor Samples: "Mr. Moss."

Ms. Moss: "Thank you, Mr. Mayor and members of council. As Ms. Fellner said, she did offer several comments to the proposed agreement that I circulated and I did incorporate all those save one, and I did not incorporate that one, frankly, because I didn't know what to put in there instead. What she had proposed would be was that a decision of council might be the final resolution of any dispute, but explicitly you have that anyway, because in the agreement the council can terminate the whole agreement upon 30-days notice. So you have that, that power to resolve disputes irregardless [sic] of what we put in here, and so, really, I mean I hope there is never a day when there's a dispute between the Youth Sports Association and the town, but assuming there is, somebody needs to decide that dispute in a, in a fair agreement that's not the town and not the Youth Sports Association, and it could be a court, and frankly that's the provision that I had in the draft contract language I used to start with. We could also put an arbitration provision in there that says that the parties have to arbitrate any dispute and that could be final. We could also put a mediation agreement that says before anybody can go to court they must participate in so many hours of mediation, and so there's all kinds of alternatives there, and it wasn't that I was disputing what Ms. Fellner had asked for, I simply didn't know what to put or what would be the pleasure of the town. If you prefer a mediation requirement, if you prefer an arbitration or to leave it at the circuit court for resolution, recognizing all the time that you have the ultimate power to terminate the whole agreement upon 30-days notice."

Mayor Samples: "Just to follow up on that questions, in the event, or in worst case there was some form of dispute, and then the town elected to terminate, is there, is there some form of a hold harmless that the town could be guaranteed."

Ms. Moss: "I'm not, in this particular provision, the entire agreement is terminable completely upon 30-days written notice."

Mayor Samples: "What if they dispute our ability to terminate it?"

Mr. Moss: "Well, there's an example of a dispute that you would have with them, but you have an express right to terminate it. As a matter of fact, there's two termination provisions in this draft. One is that the town can terminate upon 30-days notice, and then also, the Youth Sports Association can terminate, I believe it's, I believe I put a 120-days..."

Mayor Samples: "A 120-days and not during the season."

Mr. Moss: "... and not during the season, so I don't know how they could realistically dispute that, but that power's there, but if they did dispute it, the court or an arbitration proceeding would be the right place to make that decision."

Mayor Samples: "That's fine. I don't have any, you've answered my question. Any other councilmembers questions?"

Mr. Smith: "Mr. Mayor."

Mayor Samples: "Mr. Smith."

Mr. Smith: "What is, what is the exact wording in the document now?"

Mr. Moss: "You mean as to termination?"

Mr. Smith: "Yes, of, of a dispute."

Mayor Samples: "Dispute."

Mr. Moss: "Okay, I'll find it..."

Mayor Samples: "By the way, we're not gonna, this is not for vote tonight or anything like that. This is for information. I know you just got the material this morning, but it's something that we wanted to bring you up to speed on and..."

Mr. Moss: "Mr. Smith, Section 9 of the draft that I sent you this morning, it says the town shall have the right upon 30-days written notice to the SBYSA to terminate this agreement and any and all licenses granted herein, and thereafter the town shall retake possession of any and all sports equipment and resume responsibility for promoting, encouraging, directing, and operating athletic programs for the youth of Surfside Beach. Now, in the next section it provides that SBYSA shall have the right, upon 180-days notice to town to terminate the agreement upon which termination SBYSA shall relinquish all licenses granted herein, surrender all sports equipment held by it to town. However, SBYSA may not terminate this agreement such that any effective date of termination would occur during a season of any sports program. The thought being there, and it was actually Ms. Fellner's observation, that you wouldn't want them to hand it back to the town during the mid-season of any season."

Ms. Smith: "If there's a dispute, what is the wording in the agreement today for a dispute?"

Mr. Moss: "Under Section 6.4, Dispute Resolution, this draft provides if the parties hereto cannot settle any difference arising between them without litigation, any such litigation shall take place in the South Carolina Circuit Court in Conway, South Carolina."

Mr. Smith: "Thank you. I, I think we need to add some words about mediation. That's the least costly, isn't it; mediation versus arbitration."

Mr. Moss: "Yes, and I'm a, I'm a big fan of mediation and requirements that, that so many hours of mediation have to be conducted by the parties before they end up in court. I'm not, by the way, a big fan of arbitration, because in my experience, it doesn't save anybody any money."

Mayor Samples: "Next one, meeting minutes preparation, Mayor Samples. What do we want to do on our meeting minutes? We discussed it last time. We talked about going with a, all the way from a streaming live throughout the Eastern Seaboard, to a, to a video streaming, to videotaping, to old eight millimeter cameras, to hiring court reporters to take the minutes verbatim to, to just maybe try and verbatim for these last two minutes, a, meetings that we talked about. What is, what is the preference of

Ms. Dodge: "Mr. Mayor."

Mayor Samples: "Ms. Dodge."

Ms. Dodge: "I'm not gonna say a preference right now, but I am going to tell you that I looked into recording minutes. I called Myrtle Beach and spoke with their town clerk, and she gave me information about a company that does digital recording or provides digital recording equipment. They're out of Fort Lauderdale. It videotapes it, you can bookmark any person, that specific person's speech, you can convert to a PDF file or you can record audio to a Word file, so it sounds like it does a lot for you. I have the name and the number of the local representative if Ms. Fellner or someone, even you, might want to speak with them to consider this, and maybe have them do a presentation about it. It would certainly answer all of the questions. Thank you."

Mayor Samples: "Thank you. Any other comments?"

Mr. Smith: "Mr. Mayor."

Mayor Samples: "Mr. Smith."

Mr. Smith: "I, a, very much like the verbatim minutes, and I've had some folks also comment that they thought the verbatim comments they gave them a better insight as to what went on at the meeting. so I support the idea of having the verbatim minutes and as far a the video and the digital, I think it's probably appropriate that we bring that up at the budget retreat, since it will be money that we should probably allocate for next year's budget and not try to do it this year."

That a person could go online and click one particular person and it'd go right straight to that. So, I think that a that's definitely something that we should look at, possibly direct the administrator to look into that. I still a support a the verbatim minutes. I think it gives me better insight on what was discussed. I think it gives the citizens better insight on what was discussed and it's a makes us absolutely open and transparent in our town council meetings. So, I support the verbatim and also support looking into other ways that we can actually go in like you said the 21st Century at the last meeting."

Ms. Kohlmann: "I always do a lot of research and I have to say that the verbatim minutes are extremely time consuming, so I educated myself a lot this week. Although I like the verbatim minutes, when you talk to other counties, other towns, and other agencies, the ones that do, do it verbatim either outsource it or they have one person strictly doing minutes, nothing else. No, just minutes, and that's actually Horry County Council they have two a, what do they call them, Micki, administrative assistants? Yeah, two administrative assistants and one of them strictly does minutes. So I don't want people to think that I don't think Debra can type minutes. But, I know that she has a lot to do, and I think we really need to as a town look at all the avenues, because I do like that the public knows what's going on. But, if we're gonna drain our resources down to nothing, then we're gonna end up spending more money in other areas, because she's not gonna be able to do all her other work, and I, I happen to think Debra does an outstanding job now. I could never be a town clerk, because it's a lot of work, and I think that although I do support the verbatim minutes. I just want a, maybe I should just shut up and then she wouldn't have to type so much. But, I just want to let y'all know there's a lot more to it. I'd like to see the video and maybe get rid of the verbatim and we could just watch it."

Ms. Mabry: "Our minutes were 50 pages long. It took 18 hours and 53 [sic] minutes to type them. During that time, our clerk was so tied up with the minutes that she simply cannot do everything. It's impos [sic,] it's just impossible. You're taking that much time away and the town doesn't have a town clerk during that time. If any councilmember wanted to amend the minutes as they've been done for 50 years, they have every opportunity to do that. You can put for the record. If I'm up here and I want something that I think is so germane to the subject that it needs to be in the minutes, I can say for the record. Every word will be put in them. If for some reason that all that fails, we still have council comments. So there's no reason at all for any councilmember not to be able to get their point across and have it put into the minutes. I think it's ridiculous, and I'm just gonna be as honest as I can. To read 50 pages, I read them. They weren't all that interesting. Each page may have had one or two things that were very germane to the meeting. But, we do a lot of interaction. For historical purposes, I will tell you that the historical committee is going to take the minutes for the last 50 years. They're gonna try to put one year on a front and back page. Let me assure you, no one's comments [sic] is gonna be on there. Those will be just actions; that's historical. It's not what we say up here that you need to remember. It's what we do up here, and that's in the end is your historical record. So please let me tell you that there is [sic] many ways that a councilman can get their voice in the minutes and not have 50 pages to plow through. The minutes that we've done for 50 years were fine. I don't know what happened. If there was any kind of a, anybody thought they were mishandled, embellished, not embellished enough, if they thought there was, you can have an inter, go to the mayor, have an internal investigation. If that doesn't work for you, go to the Ethics Commission. But, don't sit up here and anybody act like all of a sudden we changed things. We did not."

Mayor Samples: "My question to, a, members is a, regarding tonight's minutes, what's the druthers? You want them transcribed?"

Mr. Smith: "Verbatim."

Mayor Samples: "Verbatim. Verbatim?"

Ms. Dodge: "Verbatim."

Mayor Samples: "Verbatim, okay. I do think we need to move forward and discussing it in the. the budget retreat is fine. That'll give the administrator an opportunity to look at the more cost effective means of accomplishing what it is that we would like to do. The fact of the matter is, there is technology out there that'll do this. It ain't quite as cheap when you get down to the distinguishing different voices. That's where the dilemma is. It would still probably require somebody to go through and still create a written record, but, maybe not. Who knows? Maybe next week somebody'll [sic] figure out how to, how to break that technical challenge and it'll be...so, we want to insure that the record is accurate. We want

to do it in a cost effective manner, and I would encourage all members to take advantage of their time with the staff that work directly for us, that's both the administrator and Debra Herrmann, the clerk. If you, if you have a question or a concern, share it. None of us are mind readers. Ms. Herrmann, please,"

Ms. Herrmann, "I only heard three people say verbatim. Is it council's intention that they are prepared verbatim from now on?"

Mayor Samples: "Why don't we go one meeting at a time, unless, unless somebody else...one meeting at a time is (\*\*) I think I saw more than three, no, no I understand. That's guite all right, that's quite all right. Unless I'm wrong. Speak now or forever hold your peace. I think they're verbatim. Does anyone else have any other items that they would like to speak about tonight under discussion? Ms. Dodge."

Ms. Dodge: "I have been remiss, because I keep driving by this property on 15th Avenue South, I would definitely call it a derelict property. (\*\*) weeds in the yards that are very high. The windows are board up, and apparently, kids go in there and could set it on fire. We don't know. Also, people let their dogs go in that lawn. I can imagine it's well fertilized. But that building, we've never done anything about it. I'm sure it's been at least five years like that, and I'm thinking maybe we ought to look into it (\*\*.)"

Mayor Samples: "Well, if a, if I could, Ms. Morris, go on to the podium, because I'm pretty sure this is the same property that we've been talking about, and you may want to bring Ms. Dodge up to speed as to the boarded up buildings on 15th Avenue South."

Ms. Morris: "Ms. Dodge, you're talking about the two houses that are together? They're boarded up."

Ms. Dodge: "(\*\*)"

Ms. Morris: "Yes, thank you. We have sent certified letters. We've condemned those houses, and we are working with the homeowner. One of those homes are scheduled to be demolished. The other, they've got a contractor and architect, excuse me, an engineer going to look at the property to see if they can repair it. If not, it will also be demolished. But, they are in the process of removing it, because we have condemned it.

Ms. Dodge: "Thank you, Sabrina."

Mayor Samples: "I, I hope that's good news. You know, again, staff, staff is a proactive. The mayor is proactive, and council is proactive, and so you know, but share your information with, with staff. If you have a concern, I'm gonna say it again, I'm gonna say it again, we're not mind readers, okay, and so you gotta share the information, and this is verbatim, because we've been working on those buildings for quite some time, quite frankly. This didn't happen just overnight."

Ms. Dodge: "Mr. Mayor, I have one other thing that I wanted to say. I wanted to say how great the parade was. I thought it was the best one. I had a blast riding on the council float and throwing candy, a, but I understand from a number of people that there were lag times, considerable lag times in places, and someone else called and said why didn't we have marching bands or music on the floats, or something like that to liven it up. I'm just passing along this information. I think it's good information, and maybe we could consider it for next year."

Mayor Samples: "Thank you. I, I agree with that. I think the special events-recreation committee would be happy to a, to take that up. I know that staff worked hard to try to get, a get... I think they did a great job. We would all like to see some more music, I think, and get bands out, but it's not as easy as it used to be. Any other comments? Well, I have one. I was, I was pleased today to see that the local daily newspaper reported that tomorrow that South Carolina Department of Transportation is having a public hearing and that public hearing goes from five until seven at Socastee High School. The subject of the public hearing is the completion of Carolina Bays Parkway, Highway 31, which I think many of you will

remember was approved seven, eight years ago, and did extend to Enterprise Road when it was approved. Well, that's never happened and it's under consideration again. Also, the widening of Highway 707, which I'm pretty sure everybody knows where Highway 707 is since it's an important way to get out to 544 in a hurricane, and alternative to 544. But, that's the subject of the public hearing tomorrow, and I would encourage a, the more people to turn out the better. I happened to read the, the rules that SCDOT has for tomorrow's public hearing, and the guidelines go something like this: from about five to six it'll be kind of a, a mingle and a look at what they're proposing, and talk with a, a folks, and a from six to seven that's when they'll be taking public input, which leads me to why I'm bringing this up. I plan on attending the, the meeting and I would ask council and I will do it by consensus and either you will or you won't, I would ask council to authorize the mayor to speak on behalf of the Town of Surfside Beach in support of Highway 31 and the widening of Highway 707. They a, you have to sign up to speak, that's the part I wanted to mention to you. They'll limit the number of speakers, and that sort of thing, and, and I think it's important that we talk about our need and support of these vitally important roads, not just in Surfside Beach, but the whole South Strand, so unless there's objection... Mr. Stevens."

Mr. Stevens: "I would support you doing the speaking."

Mayor Samples: "Well, thank you. Is there a consensus?"

Mr. Smith: "Yes."

Mayor Samples: "Cause that way I can say I speak for the council, not just for me individually. Thank you. Appreciate it."

Mayor Samples: "Public comments. Five minutes... Oh, I'm sorry. I am, I am sorry. The a, I'm talking about the minutes? Oh, for purposes of the committees. I've drafted a couple, I drafted some language at, frankly at the request of staff to help streamline and make it more efficient in terms of our committee operations. As you know we have a number of committees. I think a total of nine, something like that when I count. Anyway, we've got a lot of committees, and I think it's a great thing, and we want to encourage the committees to continue to do what they're actively engaged in doing. But, it's also important that we follow the Freedom of Information public notification requirements. Consequently, given that we have so many committees, there are some suggestions in these documents. Take them, read them, change them, fix them, make them better and then bring them back so that the clerk can prepare in final draft of something for us to put out to the committee members to improve them in terms of their efficiency and in compliance with Freedom of Information Act, okay."

## 9. PUBLIC COMMENTS.

Mayor Samples: "Now, it's time for public comments."

"Tom Dodge, 1415 North Poplar Drive. Being an interested party, I do not appreciate the cheap shot that the mayor took against Mrs. Dodge. It was very inappropriate. I think that the mayor and the mayor pro tem could go into one of our grocery stores and get some cheese to go along with that whine."

Mayor Samples: "Thank you, sir."

"Harry Kohlmann, 1610 South Ocean Boulevard. I'm also chairman of the parking committee. A little background on the parking committee; the first time the parking committee was set up by prior administration. It lasted about three months. We all voted unanimously for no parking on Ocean Boulevard. Compromise would have been no parking on the east side. We also thought about parking only on the west side of Ocean Boulevard. New administration came and exact same results and there were different people. Now, you wanted no parking on Ocean Boulevard, in fact some of the council who are newly elected agreed with us. A compromise would have been when we gave it to council, no parking on the east side, only parking on the west side. The mayor asked, kept asking how many spots would there be, the rest of the question is how many spots are we losing? (\*\*) thought the council was going to vote, no east side parking, there would have been 84 parking spots. Now with it, you also voted

for 10-feet from the driveway, unanimously [sic], 10-feet from the driveway, 30-feet from an intersection, and we got 84 parking spaces, 84 on the west side. We didn't count the east side, because we thought there'd be no parking on the east side, but there parking spots on the east side; quite a few parking spots. Do I know how exactly how much? No, but you can't tell me how much there aren't. I just, I just don't understand. This is a committee. We work once a week, two hours each time. This isn't a rubber stamp committee. This isn't a feel good committee. We keep getting sent things from the council, and that was not a backdoor. That was a compromise on a compromise on a compromise, and that wasn't even something that we suggest, we suggested 10-feet from a driveway for the west side, just to be safe. All the rest, it wasn't even prohibited. I just don't understand how some of the council can feel this way and I'll give you a little history. We had someone from the council come in and in a threatening voice say to us you better get your four votes. You better get four votes, because if you don't get your four votes then in two years from now we're gonna get it changed. What an open mind that was. What an open mind, and now backdoor (\*\*) means I didn't get my way. Shame on you."

"John Ard, 612 Cypress Drive, Surfside. Mr. Mayor, Council, citizens. I, too, am a member of the parking committee. I think that we have made a lot of good decisions on our committee. I heard some remarks tonight that I surely don't like (\*\*.) Everybody is entitled to an opinion, freedom of speech. Now, earlier there was talk about some no parking signs in front of some properties. These no parking signs on a public right-of-way. Now why is it that no one knows how those parking signs got there. No parking signs, I'm sorry, the no parking signs got there. We know who the property belongs to. We know exactly who it belongs to. Is it a money situation? Is that why nobody's talking? Is it cause they're on a higher up committee maybe? The fact of the matter is somebody in this town's got to know how them signs got there, whether it be somebody on this committee up here, or who. Somebody put those parking signs there. Did they have the permission of the town to put them there or did the town in fact have them put there? Someone has to know the answer the question, and here we go, you want to talk about back dooring something, that my friend is being back doored right there. If it's not public knowledge, why isn't it? These are questions we need answers to. They're questions we're not getting answers to. We [sic] getting the run around on them. And also, I don't get offended very easily. I'm a man that speaks my mind. I try, try not to offend anybody, but as far as the statement tonight that this was a backdoor maneuver to get parking off Ocean Boulevard, I think you better stop and rethink it again, and you have your opinion, now you have mine."

Mayor Samples: "Mr. Seman."

Mr. Seman, president of the Surfside Beach Youth Sports Association, "Good evening, I just want to a, I'll just change the tone a little bit. I want to thank y'all. I want to thank Mr. Moss and I want to thank Ms. Fellner for all the work y'all have been doing with this youth association. The documents look good. I'm in agreement with both of you, I think that we won't have a problem at all with any of the language in the documents. Just a couple of clarification points that I read. I just got them today, too, so. I just read them and that's all I want, and a, just, you know, have a good Christmas. Thank you."

Mayor Samples: "Thank you, sir. Merry Christmas. Ms. Ann."

"Okay, I'm Ann Wescott. 1413 Cedar Drive North. I have taken meeting minutes for years, and doing minutes verbatim does nothing but clutter up the reports. It makes it really hard to find what you're really looking for. In five years, things that I did five years ago, if I have to look up something in the minutes, it makes it really hard to find. Think twice about having them verbatim, because it's a waste of time."

Mayor Samples: "Thank you. Take it slow, Glen."

"Glen Curtis, 257 Palladium. Since it's Christmas, over the river and through the woods to my house you go. You see me walking all the time. Sometimes I come down 10<sup>th</sup>, Melody, I go down to as far as Atlantic Avenue and come along the beach every day and come up Surfside Drive. If anybody has noticed, we talk about parking, as I walk through the summer months when you need the tourism, I see

houses from Atlantic Avenue all along the beach people that put no parking signs on their own property and eliminate parking, even on side streets. So, that's something that you can look into also."

Mayor Samples: "Thank you. Ms. Kohlmann."

Ms. Kohlmann: "I would just like to say Merry Christmas and have a safe and Happy New Year."

Mayor Samples: "Ms. Dodge."

Ms. Dodge: "I think....

Mayor Samples: "I'm sorry, please do."

"I'm Sue Clark and I'm from 616 Juniper Drive, and this past election. I really looked forward to it with a lot of excitement. I've been a resident in Surfside Beach for 10 years now and have enjoyed the most part of it, and I just, I just thought wow, we finally have a council I'm happy with. Unfortunately, most of this year I've been away in Maryland, because of illness. My daddy passed away about a month ago. But, what I, what I heard tonight had a lot to do with safety issues, and there's safety issues that I don't, I don't think have come up a lot here and I don't know if it has before. Unfortunately, this is the first meeting that I've been able to attend. On Facebook there is a site (\*\*) in town, and there's a number of things that have been said on this particular site that I find troubling. One particularly said here a, when I made a comment about Mayor Samples and I really liked the vote that they had on the (\*\*.) There have been some comments about people who giggled and smirk. Apparently it was a councilmember and they wanted something in the minutes about that, and I was, I received a response back that if you wanted to see who's giggling, smirking, and constantly sending test, text messages from the back of the room to people way up in the front, pay close attention, it may surprise you. As for being a dea [sic,] a true and dear friend to you, to me, be very careful of them, because a couple of them will cut your throat in a heartbeat. In their very drama queen ways they are overlooking one important thing. What goes around comes around and back to you when you least expecting it. I didn't take that very nicely. You know, it seems rather dramatic to have threats of, of, of murder at town hall, yet, I know, it's word set in context, and a lijust think it's horrible that things have come to that, and from what I understand, and what I have gotten a number of private messages on this, is that texting is coming from citizens to members of council here up, so they can look down and get a text message and maybe respond to something in a particular way. I would like to suggest that maybe we have no cell phones sitting up on the podium during a meeting where they can receive text, and not receive texts. Take the cell phones, put them away. Everybody needs advisors, use your advisors during your executive meetings. But, I say to ... go ahead, Mayor Samples."

Mayor Samples: "You, you raise an interesting questions, and I have never gotten a text message until tonight, and it's the first text message I got, and I'd like to know who's phone number it is because what they state here is 'you are wrong.' Interestingly enough and they are entitled to their opinion, but, well I, I, I mean it is a text message, and it is coincidental, because I've never, ever gotten one before tonight, and the telephone number is 333.1011. Now, I don't know who that is. Is that you, Ron? Well, okay. I'm glad you own up to it."

Ms. Kohlmann: "Mr. Mayor, it's public comments."

Mayor Samples: "Well, I appreciate that. It was germane and she was kind enough to allow me chime in. Well, Debra's keeping time, I'm sure. Well, she forgot, so go ahead. Take as much time as you like."

Ms. Clark: (\*\*) lies and untrue about citizens, and apparently, what it boils down to, if you disagree with, I don't know, particular citizens and council members they're gonna destroy your reputation intentionally, and that's just for shame, and, and that's horrible, and I just don't know why the parking issue that went back and forth tonight, I happen to side with Mayor Samples. I don't know if there're any knives heading this way that'll cut my throat, but I'd like to say that I'd like to see no cell phones up on the

podium during town council meetings, and that I would also like people to use a little bit of a class. maybe, and there's no need for threats. We are entitled to our opinion, and as they said, they have their rights to their First Amendment, and after hearing that I'm gonna get my throat cut, I stated I have my right to the Second Amendment. People are being threatened. It is a matter for the police. They're saying if you don't vote my way, I'm gonna cut your throat. It's a police matter, and again, there are figures of speech, but I don't like threats, and then I'll leave that aside. I wish the people of Surfside Free Press would identify their selves and stop hiding behind free press. On the public safety issue we talked about the coyotes, so I'm moving on to another topic. I had an issue this July where one of my sweet baby dogs was bitten by a copperhead. It happened at night' they're nocturnal typically in the hot weather. It cost me more than \$600 in vet bills. It's cost me a lot more sleep, because I keep dreaming about stepping outside at ten o'clock at night. I think they're barking at the raccoons, possums, or the other critters that are always running around that carry rabies, and I go back and I don't know what made me pick up a flashlight, but here's a copperhead striking at my dogs. I grab a shovel. I try to get it, the copperhead gets away. It gets to the trashy yard behind my house on 6th Avenue, 6th Avenue, apparently the town came out, and a member of council helped me with this, and they got them to mow their grass. That's nice. They mow their grass once a year, but the trash is still piled up. The baby copperhead has a mommy and a daddy, and I believe it's under a shed that's ten feet from my fence, and that's not, that's not enough to mow their grass. Now they're all hibernating, and getting happy and breeding. So I don't know what I'm gonna see, see next year. So coyotes are not nearly as big a threat as copperhead snakes are and when we have all this underlying brush in the residential areas, and I'm talking about the lots that are wooded, and leave them wooded, let the critters live in these lots. We once talked about clear cutting them in another meeting in another council. But copperheads are more dangerous. You know the old saying, there are a hundred poisonous snakes in the United States, and 99 of them are in South Carolina. So, I'd like the town to look at that and that's all I have to say, but I would like both the council and the members of the a Surfside Beach to be constructive. We live in a great town. We can only make it better. Let's not make it worse by petty indifferences. Thank you."

Mayor Samples: "Thank you."

## 10. **COUNCIL COMMENTS.**

Mayor Samples: "Would you like to reconsider your comments, [Ms. Kohlmann.] No, okay. Ms. Dodge."

Ms. Dodge: "I don't have anything to say. Thank you."

Mr. Stevens: "Thanks everybody for coming out. I want to wish everybody in town a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year. I think we're making progress. Thank you for the folks that are making public comments. Remember that's your Constitutional right, and a, that was a good, nice joke about the Second Amendment, too. Thank you."

Mayor Samples: "Councilman Smith."

Mr. Smith: "Thank you guys for coming out, and I would also like to thank the parking committee for being willing to compromise, compromise, compromise. That's the way you actually get something done. So I really appreciate your efforts on that. It's gonna take some time to educate the public on this new ordinance about parking, and I'd like to suggest that the town administrator consider putting something up on our website on the first page, and that public works thinks of ways to help us identify the places people shouldn't park using shrubs, and maybe some signs at the main entrances to Surfside Beach. I think there are maybe about five main entrances, Business 17 north and south, Ocean Boulevard north and south, and Glens Bay Road. We should probably have some signs there to help people understand it. But we have to give the police department time to, a, enforce this in an intelligent way and educate the public so we will have safe places on Ocean Boulevard, as well as throughout the town and our streets. Somebody told me that the a parade, Christmas parade, was the best parade in 32 years. They had lived here that long and they thought it was the best parade. So thank you to the rec [sic] committee and Merry Christmas."

Mayor Samples: "Ms. Mabry."

Ms. Mabry: "Yes, first of all, I thank everyone for coming out. I know this is a busy season for everybody. I do want everyone to know that I do appreciate the hard work that the parking committee did. Just because I disagree with this one ordinance, does not mean that I disagree with the committee as a whole. I think that they do an outstanding job. I had, after hearing the presentation, and hearing about zones and other things that would be a little more inclusive. I thought maybe that was a better way to go. However, I do respect you, and I respect your efforts. I want to also say that for 23 years we have received a Certificate of Achievement of Excellence in Financial Reporting. I think that's outstanding, and as most of you know that I do love the finance committee. That's the part I like a lot, and that means a lot to our town. Our finance is the engine that runs the whole town, and so I am really proud of the finance committee. Again, thank you for coming out, and have a great Christmas."

Mayor Samples: "First let me say, you know, the internet has all kinds of blogs; all kinds of stuff on it. You know, it is a shame, but Surfside Free Press could actually be a, an informative local newsletter dedicated for the town. Now I have not spent much time looking at it, because I tend not to read blogs. But, I gotta be honest with you. It's been, to me, it's been a mean, nasty publication, and when people won't identify themselves, when it's done anonymously, I mean, I think, I think we should be mature enough and adult enough to distinguish between what is genuine and sincere. Rest assured, if what you said is what you read on there, don't, don't worry about it, don't worry about it at all, because it's untrue, it's an untruth. But again, everybody take the time to spend your time in what kind of entertainment that, you know, you, you choose to. With respect to the parking committee, I know they have worked long and hard. I wish that they had made a presentation to the Town Council in a workshop and presented a number of their ideas, which I know they have considered, and to suggest when we are at second reading that compromise, I mean, you know, we proposed something because we thought there would be a compromise. I don't think we ever had a chance to compromise. We never discussed it in a workshop manner. It's a very serious subject. It's a very serious subject. But, what I would say is we spent, and I'm gonna let it go. We passed, we adopted the ordinance, we did. But, it would seem to me, it would just seem to me, that since most of those houses down there are, in fact, businesses on Ocean Boulevard, I don't think anybody denies that, they're businesses. Maybe we should have got input from the business committee. Maybe we might, I know we want to do that on some other items, and I know that the committee, business committee considered the overlay on at least three different occasions. And so, it's just food for thought. It's food for thought. I wish everybody a Merry Christmas."
