A. SECOND READING, ORDINANCE 20-0928 AN ORDINANCE OF THE TOWN OF SURFSIDE BEACH AMENDING CHAPTER 4, ARTICLES VI AND VII BY REPEALING ORDINANCE NOS. 19-0889 AND 19-0890 AND REVIVING THOSE PROVISIONS OF CHAPTER 4 LOCAL HOSPITALITY FEE AND LOCAL ACCOMMODATIONS TAX AS AMENDED BY SAID ORDINANCES. Councilmember Keating motioned to accept the second reading of Ordinance 20 - 0928, amending Chapter 4, to re-instate the previous revision and in accordance with the H - tax litigation settlement. Councilmember Drake second.

Mr. Shanahan stated this was initially put forward in October with the previous settlement. Before that was an appeal, Myrtle Beach, and not validated by the judge until recently. And just to let everybody know, that when the lawsuit came for the hospitality tax, that the Town of Surfside Beach made some adjustments to their ordinances so that we could benefit more

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from the hospitality fee during the fact now that negotiations have been done. There's been a settlement on it. We need to revert to the way it was before the lawsuit. All voted in favor. **Motion Carried.**

B. FIRST READING, ORDINANCE 21-0929 AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE RECOVERY OF COSTS BY FEES FROM USERS OF FIRE PROTECTION AND EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES Mr. Shanahan stated Several months ago, and we were asked to look at the profitability, getting the insurance company to pay for some of the responses that the fire department. And by doing that, we save taxpayers money in the end. This affects the insurance company and not the citizens who are actually in the accidents. The goal is to bring back some of that money into the community that we're spending. We don't have to tax you in the future. Many other Municipalities do this.

Councilmember Keating motioned to accept the second reading of Ordinance 21-0929, providing for the recovery of costs associated with emergency services. I would make that predicated on that; we make it clear that the recovery is from the insurance companies only. It would not go back to the individuals obtaining the service. Councilmember Drake second. All voted in favor. **Motion Carried.**

C. FIRST READING, ORDINANCE 21-0930 AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND AGREEMENT FOR MANAGING VENDOR MEMORIAL PARK CRAFT MARKET Councilmember Keating motioned to accept ordinance the first reading of ordinance 20-0930, amending the agreement for the Craft Market in Memorial Park to include the specified Sundays. Councilmember Drake second.

Mr. Shanahan stated, Council let it be known that you all would like to see something offered over the weekend. Based on that, a lot of the visitors leave, and that is kind of opens up something for our citizens. We checked with the Waccamaw Market, and they're booked out on weekends, so they couldn't do it. The Events Coordinator checked around to see if we could get any other local folks that would do it, and they couldn't do it. We then went with My Olive Shack who is doing the Thursday Craft Market, and they agreed to extend the Craft Market to June 20th, July 11th, August 8th, September 12th, October 24th, November 21st, and December 12th dates.

All voted in favor. Motion Carried.

WHEREAS, Chapter 1, Section 1-12 of the Code of Ordinances of the Town of Surfside Beach, South Carolina ("Surfside Beach Code") allows for the amendment of the Code of Ordinances from time to time; and

WHEREAS, On February 26, 2019, the Town Council of the Town of Surfside Beach amended its election ordinance; and

WHEREAS, On January 22, 2019, the Town Council of the Town of Surfside Beach approved an Intergovernmental Agreement with Horry County to transfer the conduct of the town's elections to the Horry County Election Commission; and

WHEREAS, The Town compensates the Election Commission for its services; and

WHEREAS, The Town Council desires to amend certain provisions of its elections ordinance regarding determination of election results when more than one candidate is seeking election to an office to change from the nonpartisan run-off determination method to the nonpartisan plurality method, and certain provisions regarding special elections, in the best interest of the town; and

WHEREAS, The Town and Horry County approved an amendment to the Intergovernmental Agreement regarding the transfer of elections in order to authorize the changes the Town desires to make;

NOW, THEREFORE, by the power and authority granted to the Surfside Beach Town Council by the State of South Carolina, be it resolved that certain sections of *Chapter Five - Elections* of the Surfside Beach Code of Ordinances are amended as set forth hereinbelow. Sections and subsections in Chapter Five not included below are not being amended by this ordinance:

Chapter 5 - ELECTIONS

Sec. 5-1. - Authority to conduct election transferred to County Election Commission

Pursuant to § 5-15-145, S.C. Code of Laws, as amended, the Town transfers its authority to conduct municipal elections to the Horry County Election Commission.

Sec. 5-3. - Nonpartisan Elections

All nominations for Mayor and Town Council shall be nonpartisan under the nonpartisan plurality method as provided in this chapter and in §5-15-61, SC Code of Laws, as amended.

Sec. 5-32 Election of Mayor and Council

(a) General Election

The general election shall be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November in each odd-numbered year. In the event of a tie vote for any office, a runoff election shall be held pursuant to SC Code 1976, § 5-15-125.

(b) Term

The Mayor and members of Town Council shall be elected to four (4) year terms. Staggered terms shall be maintained by the election of three (3) members in each general election. So long as eligible under this Code and South Carolina law, the Mayor and Council members elected serve a four year term. Upon certification of the election results, those elected shall be sworn in and assume the duties of their respective offices at the next regular meeting of Town Council. Where the results are contested, the incumbent shall hold over until the contest is determined. No elected official may take the oath of office or enter upon his or her official responsibilities until filing a certified campaign report pursuant to § 8-13-1300, et. seq., S.C. Code of Laws.

To effect the change to elections in odd number years under this Article, the terms of office for councilmembers seated at the time of this ordinance shall be amended as follows:

- (1) Members whose terms expire in May 2020 shall relinquish their seats when members-elect from the November 2019 election are seated.
- (2) Members whose terms expire in May 2022 shall relinquish their seats when members-elect from the November 2021 election shall be seated.

Sec. 5-33 Determining Results

(a) Nonpartisan Plurality Method Adopted

Except as otherwise provided in this chapter, results in nonpartisan town elections shall be determined by the votes cast. When more than one person is seeking election to a single office, the candidate that receives the highest number of votes shall be declared

elected. When more persons are seeking election to two or more offices (constituting a group) than there are offices to be filled, those candidates receiving the highest number of votes, equal in number to the number of offices to be filled, shall be declared elected.

(ref. § 5-15-61, SC Code; §5-3, Surfside Beach Code)

(b) In the event of a tie, a run-off election shall be held two weeks following the general election.

(*ref.* §5-15-25, SC Code; §5-32(a), Surfside Beach Code)

(c) Declaration of Results

Where the results have been certified by the Horry County Election Commission, the town shall make the results available to the public not later than three (3) days following the election.

. . .

Sec. 5-34 Special Elections

A Special Election may be required to fill the unexpired term of the Mayor or any member of Town Council because of resignation, death, disqualification or any other cause requiring a special election to fill a vacancy. A "vacancy" under the terms of this section is an unexpired term of an elected official where greater than one (1) year remains. A vacancy shall be filled by special election.

Terms of filing and the election date shall be governed by applicable state law in Section 7-13-190, S.C. Code, and as follows: Filing for special elections shall be opened at noon on the third Friday after the vacancy occurs, for a period to close ten days later at noon. Candidates shall appear in person in the office of the Town Clerk for filing. The Special Election shall be set for the thirteenth Tuesday after the vacancy occurs, unless other provisions of state law apply. Public Notice of a Special Election shall be given at least sixty (60) days prior to the Special Election.

Sec. 5-51 County Election Commission

. . .

(e) The Horry County Election Commission shall determine the validity of any challenged or provisional ballots in accordance with §7-13-830 of the S. C. Code of Laws, for the primaries, general election, and any special or run-off election.

...

SEVERABILITY. If any provision, clause, sentence, or paragraph of this ordinance or the application thereof to any person or circumstances shall be held invalid, that invalidity shall not affect the other provisions of this article, which can be given effect

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE RECOVERY OF COSTS BY FEES FROM USERS OF FIRE PROTECTION AND EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES

WHEREAS, the Town of Surfside Beach Fire Department "Department" is authorized to provide emergency response relating to the protection of lives and property within the town limits and otherwise by contract or agreement; and

WHEREAS, the Department in years past has provided services to its citizens through tax revenues and certain fixed fees; and

WHEREAS, the emergency services response activity to incidents continues each year; and

WHEREAS, Section 6-1-330 of the Code of Laws of South Carolina provide authority for a local governing body to adopt service or user fees, and a public hearing was held on _____ this matter; and

WHEREAS, Section 5-7-60 of the Code of Laws of South Carolina authorizes a municipality to perform many of its functions and provide many of its services in areas outside the corporate limits by contract and to make charges therefore; and

WHEREAS, Section 4-21-10 of the Code of Laws of South Carolina provides authority for a governing body of a county to provide fire protection and ambulance services by contract with municipalities and for the charging of a service fee for services; and

WHEREAS, it is fiscally prudent and advisable to charge a fee for services including, but not limited to, motor vehicle accidents, collisions, motor vehicle fires, motor vehicle extrications, hazardous materials spills or discharge, structure fires, false alarms, fire inspections, utility line failure, and fire cause and origin investigations; and

WHEREAS, it will be cost effective to utilize a third-party Fire/EMS billing service to bill and colle	ect
for fire engine response fees and such contract should be employed; and	

WHEREAS, on ______, 2021, the Surfside Beach Town Council approved a contract with Innovapad for the provision of such services, as recommended by the Chief of the Surfside Beach Fire Department;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Town Council of the Town of Surfside Beach, that:

Section 1. Short Title.

This ordinance shall be known and may be cited as the Town of Surfside Beach Emergency Services Cost Recovery Ordinance.

Section 2. General Purpose

This Ordinance is adopted in order to provide reimbursement to the Town of Surfside Beach for a portion of the costs incurred by the town for certain emergency services provided.

Section 3. Fee Collection Authorized

The owner or occupant of a structure, vehicle, or property to which the fire department or other department of the service area provides fire suppression, emergency management services, vehicle extrication, hazardous material mitigation, emergency medical care, or other fire department services, (collectively referred to in this article as "Emergency Response Services") or any person or entity causing the need for the fire or emergency services department to respond and/or provide any emergency response service (the "Responsible Party") shall pay the cost of such service. Cost Recovery Fees are set forth in the EXHIBIT A of this Ordinance and are hereby found to not exceed the town's actual expense in providing such emergency response services. The fees enacted herein apply to any services rendered by any town department to whatever property or person, whether within the city/county or if requested by any other entity, or if supplied by the town pursuant to any interlocal cooperation agreement.

Section 4. Fees and Charges

The cost recovery fees will be collected in the amounts found in <u>Exhibit A</u>, which may be revised periodically with approval by Town Council.

Section 5. Severability

If any provision of this ordinance or the application hereof to any person or circumstance is held invalid, or in any exception to or limitation upon any provision contained herein be held to be unconstitutional, invalid or ineffective, such invalidity shall not affect other provisions or applications of the ordinance which can be given effect, and to this end, the provisions of this ordinance are declared to be severable.

Section 6. Repealer

All Ordinances and parts of Ordinances that are in conflict with this Ordinance are hereby repealed.

NOW, THEREFORE, the Town Council authorizes the recovery of costs and fees for fire and emergency response activity through a third-party Fire/EMS billing service, as authorized by Town Council, and pursuant to <u>Ex. A</u>.

EFFECTIVE DATE. This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon second reading by the Mayor and Town Council of the Town of Surfside Beach.

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Town Council of the Town of Surfside Beach in council duly assembled desire to adopt a budget for the 2021-2022 fiscal year and establish a tax millage for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2022;

NOW, THEREFORE, that the Mayor and Town Council have accepted and adopted the following calculations for the 2021-2022 fiscal year budget for expenditure and estimated revenue.

Section 1. MUNICIPAL BUDGET. That the following appropriations be, and the estimated revenue to support these appropriations set forth on **EXHIBIT 1, Attachment A** and **Attachment B**, which is attached hereto and incorporated herein as if fully set forth and in the proposed recommended budget are hereby adopted, and is hereby made part hereof as if fully set forth herein.

Section 2. Funds sufficient to cover all fiscal year 2020-2021 budget items encumbered but unpaid at the end of the fiscal year shall be carried forward to the 2021-2022 budget to meet the lawful obligations of the Town of Surfside Beach.

Section 3. The Town Council and Town Administrator shall administer the budget. In addition, the Town Administrator, with Town Council's approval, may authorize the transfer of appropriated amounts within any fund as necessary to achieve the goals of the budget. Revisions to alter any fund must be approved by Town Council. Thus, the legal level of control is at the fund level.

Section 4. TAX MILLAGE. That a tax for the general fund to cover the period from July 1, 2021, to June 30, 2022, both inclusive, of 43.0 mils is hereby levied upon all taxable property in Surfside Beach.

Section 5. MILLAGE CAP EXCEPTION USAGE. In accordance with Section 6-3-320 of the South Carolina Code of Laws, Town Council may levy additional millage, which is less than or equal to that allowed by law. As of this date, the Town of Surfside Beach millage rate may be changed as outlined in the following chart; however, Town Council has not imposed a millage increase for FY2021-2022:

I hope you all had a wonderfully safe and reflective Memorial Day this year. As the official kick-off to the summer season, the desire to travel for many is back and that promises a busy summer season. Judging from travel estimates, it seems COVID-19 is in the rearview mirror for the South Carolina coast. If we learned anything, we know how fortunate we are to live in such a beautiful area, and to have the Atlantic Ocean as a neighbor! If anyone needs a spiritual recharge, they need only walk on a sandy beach with a sea breeze for company to feel better. MYR's enplanements (66,356 for March; 106,687 for April) and deplanements (74,725 for March; 108,304 for April) increased dramatically from March to April, and May is expected to break even more records.





The 2021 Hurricane Season is here (JUNE 1ST through NOVEMBER 30TH, 2021).

After last year's busy season, we cannot afford to be complacent in 2021. Although it's quite early in the season, it's a good time to gather new supplies and replace old ones (such as batteries) that may need to be updated. Check your insurance policies and look at your home to see if anything needs to be secured or repaired before a storm event. If you don't have an evacuation plan, consider making one. If you have one, go over it to see if anything has changed (travel corridor construction issues, or shelter closings, for example). If you are considering any renovations to your home, be aware of how quickly weather can change and include a contingency plan.
