### 1. CALL TO ORDER

Mr. Johnson called the meeting to order at 4:05 PM.

## 172.APPOINTMENT OF CHAIRMAN18Mr. Smith made a motion to elect M

Mr. Smith made a motion to elect Mr. Johnson as the Chairman of the subcommittee. Ms. Blair seconded the motion. Mr. Johnson was made the Chairman of the subcommittee.

## 22 **3.** <u>PUBLIC COMMENTS</u>

**Mr. Ron Saunders, 313** 6<sup>th</sup> Avenue S: "As you go through your deliberations and choices in what you do and don't do and making this separation happen and what you do about choosing a new police chief, I would urge you very strongly to look for someone outside the town of Surfside Beach as a replacement for our Chief of Police. Not that anything is wrong with the people we have here now, but I think we need to bring people who have not been involved in the politics in this town. Bring those new people fresh to our town and let them work to make things as they should be here and that's my public comment. Thank you."

*Mr. Harry Kohlmann, 1610 S. Ocean Blvd*.: "I don't know if, in this forum, we can ask questions or not. That's a question."

There was an agreement of the subcommittee to answer questions.

*Mr. Kohlmann*: "Just curious what this committee, this subcommittee is really going to do. Are they just looking at separating the fire department from the police department or are they looking at how the police department is run or how the fire department is run and possibly personnel and stuff like that?"

*Mr. Smith*: "We are going to be looking at the organization but not necessarily the people. We will be looking at the organization of how the police is organized and how the fire department is organized and how many people are on the staffs."

46 *Mr. Kohlmann:* "OK, so, basically, I mean, there's a lot of things going on. People are 47 saying that possibly the police department is too top heavy and possibly has too many 48 chiefs and not enough Indians. It was brought up at the town council meeting that 49 possibly you should have some law enforcement experience on your subcommittee and 50 you poo poo'd that, you said that's no good. I know you're all very intelligent people. I 51 know that you know how to ask questions but I know you'll be able to ask a few

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questions. Will you know all the questions to ask? I don't know. I doubt it, but maybe you will, but will you know the correct answers you're getting? Are the answers you're getting correct? I mean, I know, you, Mr. Smith, was an engineer. My father was an engineer for 50 years. I know a little about engineering but I really don't know all of it. You're in insurance, know what? I might know a couple of questions but an insurance guy can tell me something and 'oh, ok' and you're with DHEC and you know, I don't know what DHEC does, so, I really wouldn't know what to ask. I think a fair thing for the community and the police department is to have somebody who has some kind of background knowledge; this is free. You had three people who volunteered for it and you said 'no'. Do you know what the supervisor ratio should be? You know, how many sergeants to every police officer? I mean they can tell you anything you want to hear and you're going to go 'ok, they said that'. How are they deployed? What tours are they deployed on? And this is just stuff I'm just thinking off the top of my head when I'm driving here. Do we have enough police officers here or do we have too many; how can you tell if we have too many or if we have enough? How many jobs do they go to? How many jobs do they really go to?" 

*Mr. Johnson*: "Mr. Kohlman, to answer your questions. I think this committee is going to take a look at all aspects. We're going to talk to people. This committee does not . . . you're right we don't have the answers but we're going to try to get answers; we're going to talk to department heads; we're going to talk to other police chiefs; we're going to talk to individuals that live in the town who have volunteered their time and efforts and we're going to try to do the best that we can. We may not be perfect but we're going to try to get the answers."

*Ms. Blair*: "I think everybody needs to remember that it's not just about the police department. There is equal time to be spent on both of these departments and everyone seems to be focusing so much on the police department and while I totally respect what you're saying, I think that there are times in our life that we have to trust what people are telling us. As I stated in some earlier meetings if I go the bank I trust them that they're going to tell me what I need to do. If you ask an insurance person for some input you're going to trust what they tell you and you seem to question that maybe we shouldn't trust what they tell us."

*Mr. Kohlmann*: "Being a police officer for 27 years, civilians, from what I see, you really have not much of an idea of what we do and you don't know why we do it. I mean I don't know how many millions of times I was asked 'why you do this, why you do that, why don't you do this, why don't you do that'. So both for their sake and for your sake to know what the real deal really is, I mean, you had a very good opportunity to use people in this community for free."

*Mr. Smith*: "Mr. Kohlmann, if you've got specific questions that we should ask. Why don't you write them down for us and if you've got specific answers that you think should be, write them down for us."

*Mr. Kohlmann*: "I don't know what the answers should be. I'd have to be there when
the question's asked. It's not just writing all the correct answers to the questions down,
you have to know what the correct answer's going to be. You know, on the police
department side they might try to justify their existence because they don't want to lose

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101 their job or they don't want their friend to lose a job. You have, just in equipment, I 102 don't know how many . . . I have no idea how many police officers are employed here, 103 how many sergeants are employed here, how many corporals. How many radio cars are 104 here, I mean, you can see there's 8 to 10 of them marked (\*\*\*) radio cars sitting in the 105 parking lot. Well there's only like 3 or 4 guys on patrol. That's a lot of extra cars."

107 Mr. Johnson: "Well, those specific questions, sir, are not for this subcommittee to 108 answer. I appreciate your concern, you have to realize we're just getting going on this 109 thing and you know; we'll see where it leads us." 110

Mr. Kohlmann: "Before you said about personnel issues, so, I just thought that's what you were looking at also."

Mr. Johnson: "Well, that's one part of it; it's not the entire thing."

Mr. Kohlmann: "Ok, thank you."
