August 2011 Project Status

Currently Funded Projects

US 17 Business and Glenns Bay Road

- This is a GSATS funded intersection improvement involving minor improvements to intersection and pedestrian accommodations. They are trying to include this project with the Glenns Bay Sales tax project.
- Staff addressed the pedestrian improvements at the scoping meeting on October 12th.
 - SCDOT agreed to work on improved pedestrian accommodations including refuge islands due to the brevity of the crossing light in relation to the width of the road
 - SCDOT agreed to use stamped asphalt in keeping with our current paver scheme.
 - We would, however, be required to maintain the stamping of the crosswalks once in place

More Currently Funded Projects

Glenns Bay Road Widening

- This project is funded by Horry County sales tax program and is partially in the Town of Surfside City limits.
- This project consists of building an interchange at US 17 Bypass and Glenns Bay Road and widening Glenns Bay Road.
- The county has started right of way acquisition.

Median Enhancements

- This project calls for removing Bradford pears and replacing them with palm trees crepe myrtle and knockout roses on Business 17 from 17th Avenue North to Melody Lane
 - It is an 80/20 matching grant (up to \$40K from SCDOT)
 - The use of palm trees is still being discussed as SCDOT engineers do not feel they are suitable
- SCDOT will be project managers
- There is a meeting between staff and Brian Dix and Leah Quattlebaum of SCDOT, scheduled for September 7th, to attempt to move this process forward

Funded Projects Needing Council Vote

Subsequent to the scoping meeting on October 12, 2010

- Since the Subcommittee was unable to bring a united recommendation to Council on any of the items discussed all motions failed.
- Consequently, SCDOT will approve no further meetings regarding funded road projects unless council has first demonstrated by a majority vote their intent to move forward with a project. This includes ...
 - US 17 Business and 5th Avenue North
 - SCDOT suggested providing temporary barricades to prevent through movement on Frontage Road. These dollars have now been permanently taken away from Surfside Beach and given to other municipalities
 - Light on 17 between 13th and 16th Avenues North
 - SCDOT engineers and vehicle counts do not currently agree with subcommittee assessment for putting a light at 16th Avenue instead of 13th Avenue and, consequently, these funds could possibly be taken away from Surfside Beach
 - 2011-2015 GSATS intersection improvement at US 17 Business and 10th Avenue South
 - The committee would need to make a recommendation to Council and Council would need a majority vote connoting their intent to move forward with the project for GSATS and SCDOT to proceed
 - 2035 widening of Business 17 and eradication of frontage roads

Other Road Projects in Progress

► 10th Avenue Culvert

- We have now taken over the road from Ocean Boulevard to Cedar Drive
- Earthworks is currently writing the bid specifications
- We are expecting the project to cost \$60K to \$100K
- We have CTC funding of up to \$100K for this project
- John Adair has arranged for a free test of "Liquid Road" on Pine Street between 17 and North Poplar Drive
 - Good for roads with low to moderate traffic
 - Product is for resurfacing and has a similar lifespan to asphalt
 - Cost is approximately one third that of asphalt
 - Demonstration is scheduled for September 10th

Other Road Projects in Progress

- Crosswalks on Surfside Drive between Floral Drive North and Poplar Drive
 - The contractor can begin either the week of October 24th or October 31st
 - This will require the closing of the road (7 days each side). The contractor would prefer to close the entire block for 7 days and do everything at one time but staff explained that this would not be good for our downtown businesses.
 - End caps for central island will be done at the same time.

Road Paving in Surfside Beach

- The plan that went into effect in 2009 was carefully studied and was not found to reflect the best interest of the Town with regard to paving.
- In lieu of creating a new comprehensive plan, John Adair, Director of Public Works, has prioritized, in accordance with condition and need, a repaying hierarchy.
- To fund this, he will ask the CTC for \$200K over the next year with which to pave 8 streets
- Additionally, the Town currently has a balance of \$459,306 in its "Streets Fund".

Additional Concerns

- Request by Councilman Childs to ask SCDOT to change the yield signs on the frontage road to stop signs
- Over a year ago the Coast RTA agreed to reimburse us 100% of the cost for the procurement of materials and labor to construct two concrete pads to specifications.
 - The Coast RTA would then have their contractor install a shelter, bench, and trash receptacle on each pad.
 - The locations were chosen, and bids were obtained for the concrete work.
 - In addition, a state encroachment permit was filed with SCDOT. Their response came with a booklet of special conditions for bus shelters, which would be almost impossible to meet.
 - Staff turned the booklet over to the Coast RTA's planner, George Osborne, who is attempting to work something out with SCDOT so this project can move forward.
